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The North Carolina Museum of Art receives Jaume Plensa gift from Capitol Broadcasting Company

RALEIGH, N.C. – The North Carolina Museum of Art announced today it has received a gift of three Jaume Plensa sculptures, *Doors of Jerusalem I, II, and III*, from Capitol Broadcasting Company. The works of art will be installed in the lobby of the Museum's new building, which is slated for completion in late 2009.

"The work of Jaume Plensa is spectacular and innovative," said Jim Goodman, president and CEO of Capitol Broadcasting Company. "We are pleased to bring his work to the North Carolina Museum of Art."

Spanish sculptor Jaume Plensa is an internationally renowned artist at the forefront of contemporary art. With its contextually diverse, layered nature, Plensa's sculptures demand participation to enhance and extend their significance. *The Doors of Jerusalem I, II and III* are simultaneously one of Jaume Plensa's most intimate and compelling works done on a greater-than-human scale.

Cast in a translucent polyester resin and lit internally, the sculptures emit a strong, pure white light. This, combined with their sacred pose, lends a divine or celestial quality to the work. This notion is reinforced by the title of the work, which references the ancient gates of a holy city.

The sculptural surface is tattooed with words – or as Plensa describes them "an extension of our bodies, [intended] to expand our thoughts and ideas to the external world." The text is derived from the Old Testament: *Song of Solomon* or *Song of Songs* which is both a love poem and an allegory for love. Plensa's message is implicit – the viewer must decide for himself if the chosen excerpts speak of God's love, a carnal love, or another type of love.

"We are grateful to Capitol Broadcasting Company for this generous gift," said Museum Director Lawrence J. Wheeler. "These extraordinary sculptures are an important addition to our collection and will bring great energy to the new Museum building."

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Plensa's work is exhibited in major museums and galleries throughout the world, including the Galérie Nationale du Jeu de Paume in Paris; the Henry Moore Sculpture Trust in Halifax, England; the Malmö Konsthallen in Sweden; Städtische Kunsthalle, Mannheim; Musée d'Art Contemporain, Lyon; Museo Luigi Lecci in Prato, Italy; Museo Reina Sofia, Madrid; Museum der Modernen Kunst, Vienna, and in New York, Chicago and Tokyo.

His numerous outdoor projects and commissions for public spaces include installations in the U.S., Europe, and Japan, and he has recently completed projects for the cities of Washington D.C., Chicago, Seoul, Stockholm, and Jerusalem.

The Doors of Jerusalem I, II, and III were exhibited in "Canetti's Dream" at Mario Mauroner Contemporary Art in Vienna, Austria, April 1–June 3, 2006. They will be on exhibition in "Sho" at Musée d'Art Modern et d'Art Contemporain MAMAC in Nice, France, November 22, 2007–April 27, 2008.
